By the end of this unit, you will know what printing is and what techniques and materials you can use. You will know who Stephen Fowler is and evaluate some of his work. You will create your own print piece of artwork.



Stephen Fowler is an artist and illustrator specialising in primitive DIY printmaking with both rubber stamps and roller printing technologies. His work is held and exhibited in galleries and museum collections across the UK, Europe and North America. He is a keen teacher of his methods at many popular workshops.

Printmaking is making art by printing pictures, normally on paper. The

advantage of printmaking is that lots of the same picture can be printed. This is called a print. Each print is not a copy, but an original, since it came from the same source (not like painting or drawing). You can also use different types of techniques to start the print.

Printmaking techniques are generally divided into the following basic categories:

Relief, where ink is applied to the original surface of the matrix. Relief techniques include woodcut or woodblock as the Asian forms are usually known, wood engraving, linocut and metalcut.

Intaglio, where ink is applied beneath the original surface of the matrix. Intaglio techniques include engraving, etching, mezzotint, aquatint.

Planographic, where the matrix retains its original surface, but is specially prepared and/or inked to allow for the transfer of the image. Planographic techniques include lithography, monotyping, and digital techniques.

Stencil, where ink or paint is pressed through a prepared screen, including screen printing.
